Spring 2024 Exhibition

Mar. 26 through May 11, 2024

Making Our History—Artists Render Lincoln's Legacies

Opening reception: 5 to 7 p.m. Thursday, April 4.

Informal talk with project coordinators Brytton Bjorngaard and Graham A. Peck to begin at 5:45 p.m.

This exhibition was produced by University of Illinois Springfield Director of Visual Arts and professor of graphic design Brytton Bjorngaard and Wepner Distinguished Professor of Lincoln Studies Graham A. Peck. Twenty Illinois artists in a virtual residency created paintings, sculptures, prints, photography, virtual reality, conceptual and video artwork. The artwork showcases the many sides to Lincoln that permeate our perception of the former president through each artists' interpretation of Lincoln's legacies: the frontier Lincoln, the family man, the politician, the military chieftain, the emancipator, the icon, the saint, the pop culture figure and cultural artifact, the Land of Lincoln and Lincoln's still resounding political legacy. Accompanying this exhibition are video interviews produced by Storyteller Studios of Springfield that provide insight into each artists' practice, research and project. In addition, Professor Peck has written essays that contextualize their work in relation to Lincoln history.

This exhibition has been curated by our program assistant Shelby Edelmann and discusses the history of the creation of the Lincoln Highway, how it shaped cross-country travel across the United States and the roots of the Lincoln Highway here in DeKalb County.

We want to welcome the new Director of the NIU Center for Burma Studies, Dr. Aurore Candier, Ph.D. in History and Civilizations, École des Hautes Êtudes en Sciences Sociales (EHESS) Paris, France. Her 2020 International Convention of Asia Scholars prize-winning book, La réforme politique en Birmanie pendant le premier moment colonial (1819-1878) [The Political Reform in Burma during the First Colonial Moment (1819-1878)] will soon be available in English.

We would also like to congratulate Carmin Berchiolly, the former Program Director of the Center for Burma Studies, who was recently promoted to Curator of Burmese Collections.

NIU Art Museum Collection Spotlight: Letterio Calapai

Evanston art collector Joel S. Dryer acquired the entire estate of prolific printmaker Letterio (Leo) Calapai several years ago and has been systematically donating large groups of these prints to museums around the country (most recently to Syracuse University in upstate New York).

The donation to NIU numbers about 300 intaglio prints, wood engravings and lithographs, spanning the 1930s until the artist's death in Glencoe, IL in 1993. In the 1940s, Calapai served as a chief technician at Stanley William Hayter's Atelier 17 printmaking workshop in New York City. "The connection to Hayter is significant in its own right but is especially meaningful to our collection here at NIU," mentions Assistant Director Peter Olson. "Hayter also trained Mauricio Lasansky, who was David Driesbach's teacher in graduate school." Continued on page 8...



When he had a sabbatical in 1969, Driesbach took the opportunity to travel to Atelier 17 (then located in Paris) to work with Hayter himself. "Our collection holds prints by Hayter, Lasansky, Driesbach and Calapai, and a photographic archive of the famous Atelier 17 printmaking studio. In the cases of Driesbach and Calapai, we have several working proofs and drawings, as well as finished prints, enhancing the educational richness of this resource," adds Olson.
